



# My Work Can Be Seen Again!

## Year 1 Home Learning Task Online Reputation

Summer Term

In our online safety lessons, we have been learning about online reputation and how what we share online can stay there.



### What is online reputation?

It means understanding that things we create or share online can still be seen later, even if we can't see them straight away.

**Things I share online can stay there.**



### Your Home Learning Task – Copy Cat Game

Play a simple drawing game together!

1



#### Child creates a picture

Your child draws a simple picture.

2



#### Copy the picture

You carefully copy your child's drawing. Compare the pictures together.

3



#### Repeat the game

Swap roles or create a new picture. Copy it again.

4



#### Hide the drawings

Put the pictures somewhere out of sight. Ask: "Are they still there even though we can't see them?"



Explain: Just like online, things can still exist even when we can't see them.



### Talk Together

You may wish to talk about:

- How did it feel when someone copied your work?
- Are the pictures still there when we hide them?
- What might happen to things we put online?
- Why is it important to think before we share?



### What to do together

1

#### Talk about it

Ask your child about their picture and the game you played. Listen to their ideas.



2

#### Play the game

Enjoy the Copy Cat drawing game together.



3

#### Hide the drawings

Hide them away and talk about how they are still there even if we can't see them.



4

#### Share with school

Please upload a photo of your drawings to Tapestry. This allows us to celebrate your child's learning.



### Key Message

#### Things I share online can stay there.

It is important to think before we share and to ask a trusted adult if we are not sure.



### Top tip for parents

Once something is shared online, it can be difficult to remove completely. Encourage your child to always check with a trusted adult before sharing.
