In our online safety lessons, we have been learning about copyright and ownership.

I can recognise that content on the internet may belong to other people.



### What is copyright and ownership?

When someone creates something – like a picture, text, video or website – it belongs to them. It is their work.

We must respect other people's work online.

Explore online content together and try to find examples of different types of content where the owner is shown.

A photo/image on a website



An article on a news/information site



A blog post



A video on a video-sharing site



An app on an app store

#### Think about content

Talk about things your child has created or shared online.

#### Complete the checklist

Work together to fill in the checklist above for different types of content.



**3**

#### Discuss ownership

Who does this content belong to? Is it okay for others to use it without asking?



**4**

#### Reflect together

Explain that even when something is shared online, it still belongs to the person who created it.



**5**

#### Bring into school

Please bring this completed task into school. Your child will add it to their computing book.



### Suggested discussion points

- How would you feel if someone used your work without asking?
- Why is it important to give credit to others?
- What should you do before using someone else's work?
- Is it always easy to tell who something belongs to online?



### Key Message

Online content belongs to the person who created it.



### Parent/Carer Tip

Encourage your child to:

- Ask permission before using content
- Say where something came from
- Talk to a trusted adult if unsure
